"He Left Us in Order to Be Nearer to Us All!"

"Jesus led them out as far as Bethany...And it came about while He was blessing them, He parted from them." [Luke 24:50-51]

May is filled with events and occasions celebrated in the church. One of them, *Ascension Day*, can fall in either May or June. It marks Jesus' departure from this world and deserves a special place in the hearts

and minds of Christians. Shrouded in mystery, it describes something beyond description.

Luke is the only Gospel writer to record Jesus' departure from this world, but as a physician, he is well-qualified to do so and he does it twice: in his Gospel and in the Book of Acts. He doesn't use the word "ascend," instead he writes: "carried up," "lifted up" and "taken up." Luke isn't telling us about a closure, but rather a new association because the ascended body of Jesus was the same—yet different from the one that was laid in the tomb. It was a "glorified" body—fit for both heaven and earth. It's the kind of body we'll be given when Jesus comes again.

In His last hours Jesus told His disciples, "I go to prepare a place for you. And seeing that I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again...that where I am you may be also!" [John 14:2-3] Yes, science may tell us where our bodies came from, but only the Ascension can tell us where our bodies are

going and that's to be with Jesus. We aren't fitted for heaven unless Jesus is there.

But most important of all, the Ascension assures us that the humanity of Jesus was taken into heaven with Him. Jesus Who ascended is and always will be Jesus: "conceived by the Holy Spirit...born of the Virgin Mary...suffered under Pontius Pilate...crucified, died and buried...risen again." What does all this mean? It means that God knows now, in a way He didn't know before, what it's like to be human. He knows what it means to be tempted as we are tempted. He has had the experience of growing from infancy to youth to adulthood. He knows what it's like to be hungry and tired, loved and scorned, lonely and forsaken. He knows what it's like to be a good person in a bad world. It also means that when Jesus ascended into heaven, He didn't leave the world in the sense He's no longer here. On the contrary, He left in order that He might be nearer to us all!
